

From our Rector

Even though this is the August Trinity Talk, I want to tell/ remind you about a couple of things coming up in September.

The first has to do with Labor Day weekend's International Street Fair here in Orange. Trinity has once again been awarded supervision of the small parking lot on the south side of Almond in between Center and Glassell, the same lot we had two years ago. In exchange for monitoring parking in the lot for the duration of the Street Fair (at \$10 per car), Trinity gets to keep all the proceeds. (In 2015 we made just under \$3,000 in this same location!)

With Rev. Annie handling the sign-up sheets for the various volunteer shifts, Senior Warden Carl Watson will oversee our weekend commitment. We are responsible for supervising the lot on Friday, Sept. 1 from approximately 5 p.m. – 9 p.m.; Saturday, Sept. 2 from the Street Fair's opening until 9 p.m.; and on Sunday, Sept. 3 until the Fair closes at 5 p.m.

(These times are approximate. The actual shift times and durations will be listed on the sign-up sheets that will be posted on the back bulletin board in August.)

As anyone who has volunteered for parking lot duty either two years ago or four years ago (non-profits are awarded the lots by the City of Orange on an "every other year" basis) will be quick to say, this is a wonderful opportunity for fellowship and service in a festive setting. All shifts will have at least one vestry member present, so no one is ever left "holding the (money) bag" alone!

Not long after the Street Fair will have come and gone, we'll be turning our thoughts to Bishop John Taylor's visit to administer the sacrament of Confirmation at the 10 a.m. service on Nov. 5, All Saints' Sunday, but even more immediately to the Adult Inquirers Classes that will lead up to this visit.

Beginning on Sept. 17 and ending on Oct. 29, the Adult Inquirers Class will meet every Sunday afternoon in the parish library from 4 p.m. – 5:30 p.m. Working with the Rev. Dennis Maynard's book Those Episkopols, we'll talk about the history and worship of the Episcopal Church as well as its structure and governance, the sacraments, the Prayer Book, the Creeds, and more. All questions are welcome and all discussions are a lot of fun!

The Adult Inquirers Class is appropriate for just about anybody here at Trinity. Are you new to Trinity and you'd like to know more about the Episcopal Church? Adult Inquirers is for you. 

If Confirmation, Reception, or Reaffirmation on Nov. 5 is calling to you, you'll be joining those members of our "Confirm not Conform" class who choose to be Confirmed as well.

If all of this has you completely confused or if you have questions about the whole Confirmation/Reception/Reaffirmation thing, just give me a call and we'll talk.

At the very least, please mark your calendars so that you can be sure to be at Trinity on Nov. 5 to help welcome Bp. Taylor and honor our Confirmands. The 10 a.m. service will be followed by a reception and I'm sure there will be plenty of photo-ops suitable for Facebook!





BOOK CLUB

The Book Club will be meeting on **Saturday** August 12th. This month the group will read The Art of Racing in the Rain by Garth Stein. The discussion will be from 9:30am—11am. Please join them for a rewarding literary morning. A synopsis follows:

Enzo knows he is different from other dogs: a philosopher with a nearly human soul (and an obsession with opposable thumbs), he has educated himself by watching television extensively, and by listening very closely to the words of his master, Denny Swift, an up-and-coming race car driver.

Through Denny, Enzo has gained tremendous insight into the human condition, and he sees that life, like racing, isn't simply about going fast. Using the techniques needed on the race track, one can successfully navigate all of life's ordeals.

On the eve of his death, Enzo takes stock of his life, recalling all that he and his family have been through: the sacrifices Denny has made to succeed professionally; the unexpected loss of Eve, Denny's wife; the three-year battle over their daughter, Zoë, whose maternal grandparents pulled every string to gain custody. In the end, despite what he sees as his own limitations, Enzo comes through heroically to preserve the Swift family, holding in his heart the dream that Denny will become a racing champion with Zoë at his side. Having learned what it takes to be a compassionate and successful person, the wise canine can barely wait until his next lifetime, when he is sure he will return as a man.

A heart-wrenching but deeply funny and ultimately uplifting story of family, love, loyalty, and hope, The Art of Racing in the Rain is a beautifully crafted and captivating look at the wonders and absurdities of human life . . . as only a dog could tell it.

The Down Syndrome Association of Orange County

Empowering people with Down syndrome to reach their full potential...



Outreach started supporting the DSAOC in 2004 by donating to and participating in their annual Buddy Walk with Becca Mattson. The DSAOC was founded in 1978 by a small group of dedicated parents sitting around a kitchen table. Now thirty years later, DSAOC continues to build on those strong traditions of the past by serving more than 2,000 families in and around Orange County.

The DSAOC Center, located in Costa Mesa, is the venue for many activities, events, seminars, and support groups. In addition, much of their work includes outreach and collaboration with an expanding network of educators, healthcare providers, researchers, therapists, employers, policymakers, and many others in the community.

Down syndrome is named after Dr. John Langdon Down, an English physician who first described the characteristic features of Down syndrome in 1866. "Down Syndrome" is used, as opposed to "Down's Syndrome", because it was named after Dr. Down. Down syndrome occurs in approximately 1 in every 733 live births. It is not related to race, nationality, religion, or socio-economic status. Nothing that a parent did or did not do during the pregnancy causes a baby to have Down syndrome. It occurs evenly in male and female babies.

For an unexplained reason in cell development, each cell obtains 47 instead of the usual 46 chromosomes. The resulting medical diagnosis is Down syndrome and is generally diagnosed as Trisomy 21, which describes the presence of all or part of an extra 21st chromosome. This extra chromosome causes changes in the orderly development of the body and brain, as well as the physical characteristics and delayed physical, intellectual, and language development associated with Down syndrome.

People with Down syndrome are more like their typically-developing peers than they are different. They will have a full range of emotions and attitudes, are creative and imaginative in play, and grow up to live independent lives with varying degrees of support and accommodations. Individuals with Down syndrome will establish friendships, pursue interests, and be included in community activities. Children with Down syndrome benefit from the same care, attention, and inclusion in community life that help every student grow. As with all children, quality education in neighborhood schools, pre-schools, and at home is important to provide the opportunities needed to develop strong academic and social skills.
