The Book Club will be meeting on **Saturday February 11th**. The group will have a discussion on the book <u>The All-Girl Filling Station's Last Reunion by Fannie Flagg</u>. They meet in the library from 9:30am - 11:00am. Join them for a truly enjoyable morning, and some lively literary discussions. A synopsis follows:

Mrs. Sookie Poole of Point Clear, Alabama, has just married off the last of her daughters and is looking forward to relaxing and perhaps traveling with her husband, Earle. The only thing left to contend with is her mother, the formidable Lenore Simmons Krackenberry. Lenore may be a lot of fun for other people, but is, for the most part, an overbearing presence for her daughter. Then one day, quite by accident, Sookie discovers a secret about her mother's past that knocks her for a loop and suddenly calls into question everything she ever thought she knew about herself, her family, and her future.

Sookie begins a search for answers that takes her to California, the Midwest, and back in time, to the 1940s, when an irrepressible woman named Fritzi takes on the job of running her family's filling station. Soon truck drivers are changing their routes to fill up at the All-Girl Filling Station. Then, Fritzi sees an opportunity for an even more groundbreaking adventure. As Sookie learns about the adventures of the girls at the All-Girl Filling Station, she finds herself with new inspiration for her own life.

Fabulous, fun-filled, spanning decades and generations, and centered on a little-known aspect of America's twentieth-century story, <u>The All-Girl Filling Station's Last Reunion</u> is another irresistible novel by the remarkable Fannie Flagg.

THE STATE OF THE PARISH ADDRESS Trinity Episcopal Church, Orange, California

First, I'd like to begin this State of the Parish address with our pre-sermon prayer because that's always a good way to start anything.

Please pray with me: Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in us the fire of your love. Amen.

Yesterday morning, when I read through all the reports in our Annual Meeting packet, I was, and still am, deeply touched by the level of commitment our congregation has to God, to the greater community beyond our campus, and to each other. Through 2022 and here early in 2023, we have faced challenges; we have received blessings; and we have experienced loss; and the mutual love we share in Christ in this place has been key in helping us all stay the course.

Among our challenges has been the vital and now permanent ministry of our hybrid worship, and the technological and audio issues that crop up from time to time. Our tech teams have gotten pretty good at troubleshooting (and at working a second camera when we have baptisms); but every now and then there are gremlins in the system! Thank you to Carl and Donna Watson, Mike Donaldson and Isabel Salazar, and David Ripley for continuing to battle the gremlins.

Another challenge that's had an impact throughout our ministry areas is our reduced volunteer base. Between moves out of state and the natural attrition of time, age, and illness, we don't have the "depth on the bench" that we've had in the past; and because we have fewer hands available, we've needed to be flexible and creative in how we carry out our ministries. It used to be said that "the last seven words of a dying church" are "But we've **always** done it that way!"

I don't think ANYTHING is "how we've always done it" anymore, and kudos to the Altar Guild, the Ushers, the Choir, Lay Eucharistic Ministers, and everyone else who's had to let go of "how they'd *always* done" their ministries, and then go on to create something new.

Another big challenge – the ongoing conversation re permits with the City of Orange that has created timing delays in our window replacements, stucco repair, water damage repair by the sacristy and Bride's Room, and the Bride's Room bathroom remodel. A good portion of the funding for these various projects has been provided by individual donors, and we continue to thank you for your generosity in both treasure and time, and we're grateful for your patience. On a more positive note, these same donors have been instrumental in helping to make possible our new and **in-place** gates, front step handrails, and extensive security fences and HVAC unit protection cages. Again, many, many thanks for your generosity and your honoring God through your work in this place.

The most emotional and most spiritual challenge for 2023, of course, is the upcoming search process for Trinity's next Rector. I can't say anything about the details because, as Diocesan policy requires, I haven't been part of the Vestry's conversation with Fr. Thomas Quijada-Discavage, the Diocesan Transitions Officer -- but I will make a big pitch here for TRUST. Trust the Vestry, trust the process, and above all, trust the Holy Spirit. As I've said before, things worked out pretty well for all of us the last time around!

Granted, the last time around was simpler logistically because Fr. Paul was already in place to provide clergy continuity, but the process itself contained exactly the same unknowns then as it does now. Trust the process.

Our challenges, of course, have been balanced with blessings along the way. We've returned to full in-person worship with the Choir and congregational singing, and with both bread and wine available at Communion. Our worship ministries of the Choir, Altar Guild, Lectors and Lay Eucharistic Ministers, Acolytes, Ushers, Bell Choir, and AV Teams have become more and more resilient, flexible, and creative with every week that goes by -- and we as a congregation have learned to go with the flow!

We've returned to a regular schedule of in-person Outreach events, monthly Parish Dine Outs, and, last summer, Messy Church. Yay! We've also returned to our ministry of hosting Sunday Supper at St. Paul's, Tustin every other month. Again, everyone's generosity in their stewardship of time, talent, and treasure has been spectacular and very much appreciated. You are all keeping us strong!

We've also experienced the losses that come with life itself. One loss was both sad and happy, as we bid Rev. Annie and Pastor Buddy farewell and Godspeed in their move to Washington state where Annie is now the much-loved Vicar of St. Anne's Episcopal Church, Washougal, WA.

Other losses were more poignant. Since just before our Annual Meeting last year, we've said good-bye to Betty Johnson, Jack Crabbs, Joyce Yoder, Jeanne Fischle, Jane Abeysinghe, Carolyn Lussier, and Jerry Jensen – and we've finally been able to celebrate the life of Diana Hubbard who died in January of 2021 while we were still locked down.

With all these dear friends in our hearts, let us pray: Father of all, we pray to you for Betty, Jack, Joyce, Jeanne, Jane, Carolyn, Jerry, and Diana, as well as for all those we love, but see no longer: Grant them your peace; let light perpetual shine upon them; and in your loving wisdom and almighty power, work in them the good purpose of your perfect will; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

As an aside, Tilani Samarasekera left for Sri Lanka yesterday, taking her mother Jane's ashes back for interment there, so we also pray for safe travel for Tilani. Through challenge, blessing, and loss, we were all able to depend on our parish leaders: the Wardens, Lindsay Whipple and Alex Long, and Vestry, as well as Clerk Mike Donaldson and Treasurer Jack Reynolds – and thank you, Mike, for serving once again as Clerk of this Annual Meeting. We were able to depend on our parish staff: Parish Administrator Amy Morales, Music Director David Ripley, first Rev. Annie and now Alex Long as Youth Director, co-Christian Education Directors Heather Anderson and Suzanne Bilodeau, Acolyte Director Grant Avise, Ophelia Bueno in the nursery, and baristas Simone Bilodeau and Jacob Candela.

We were also able to depend on all our supportive volunteers – the Property Commission, the Kitchen Guild, the Parish Nurses who once again sponsored a flu vaccination clinic, as well as the recent in-person Alzheimer's Worship Service and Luncheon; the Parish Hall and Messy Church AV crew; the Counters, Bulletin Stuffers, Bulletin Strippers, and Office Volunteers; and, of course, we continue to depend on everyone who attends and participates in our small group ministries such as the Saturday Book Club, the Prayer Shawl ministry, the online Friday Bible Study Group, the Spiritual Transitions Group, as well as the various short-term discussion groups offered during the year. Once again, you are all keeping us strong – and we can't wait for the return in person of the Trinity Players, coming up this May!

At this point, I'd like to make special mention of a quiet but mighty parish ministry that supports all of us, whether we're aware of it or not. The Contemplative Prayer Group meets in person in the Youth Center on the first and third Thursday evenings at 7 p.m., and at home on the other Thursday evenings of the month, each person praying in their own home, but still praying together in the Spirit. For approximately 20 to 30 minutes, those who are participating sit in silence, open to the presence, the love, and the power of God – as one spiritual director has said, "leaning back into the conversation that is already taking place" in the depths of all our beings. As they do so, this Prayer Group holds all of us and, in fact, holds our entire world in the creative, redemptive, healing, living energy that is prayer.

If anyone would like to know more about Contemplative Prayer and the Contemplative Prayer Group, Jonnae Ostrom – who didn't know I was going to say this – would be more than willing to provide additional information. Their prayers are weaving golden strands of love, a golden web of prayer, around us all, every week.

Depend on their prayers and on all our prayers. Depend on each other; and most of all, depend on the power and the guidance of that same Holy Spirit who came upon the Church at Pentecost. Kindled by the fire of the Spirit's love, Trinity has a wonderful whirlwind future ahead of her, and all to the glory of God.

The state of this parish is very, very good – because I'm not the parish. All of **you** are the parish – and in the power of the Holy Spirit, YOU ARE TRINITY STRONG. Amen.


PARISH DINE OUT
